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## Currently ...

Spring has sprung and summer is about to set in. It's the time of year the association gears up for summer maintenance activities. The KHA maintenance committee is tasked with an incredible scope of work, including all immediate and long-range needs for our parks, bridle paths, lakes, ponds, roadways, signs, common areas, and general landscaping.

A few things the committee is currently working on:

### Lakes

- removal of invasive tallow trees along our lakes shorelines
- removal of invasive water hyacinths in the lakes

### Parks

- working with City on a TAPP grant for erosion control at Bayshore Park
- completion of playground at Bayshore Park
- review of proposals as they come in for rehabilitation of Killarney Park
- brainstorming ideas for potential uses of Blarney Park

### Bridle Paths

- determining options for long-term repair of eroded areas
- determining potential uses of bridle trails, such as possible exercise stations
- create list of new signage locations at various intervals

### Miscellaneous

- determining options to reduce speeding on our roadways
- establish an updated master maintenance schedule

Whew! Coordinating maintenance for such a large community is a monumental ongoing task for which the members of the Maintenance Committee are very dedicated. Those members are Michelle Condo, David Ferguson, Mike Flemming, Meghan Holly, Joan Kanan, Catherine Knickerbocker, Melinda Pillar, Charlie Schwartz, and Gloria Arias as the chairperson. They meet twice monthly to update, coordinate, and plan. They also

frequently meet with staff and vendors in the field to identify issues and opportunities. Kudos to them all for their hard work and dedication!

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# TAKE THE TIME TO KNOW WHAT YOU POSSESS AND LISTEN TO YOUR DOGS!

March 18<sup>th</sup>, 2016 was a typical Friday night of relaxing after a long and strenuous work week. My wife, Ramona, and I shared a meal with our two sons, Jason and Neil, and had just settled in for the evening.



We live on a shared, private drive that accesses 20 homes and we are always warned by our two black labs when someone is walking down the road. On this particular night, the dogs were barking excessively and raising hell for at least twenty minutes when we heard a loud explosion that finally got us out of our recliners to see why the dogs were barking. Our

walkout basement garage, located under half the upper living level, had been on fire. The dogs had been trying to alert us to the fire, which was growing by the minute. At that point, we only had a few minutes to get out of harms way. All of our material possessions that we had accumulated over a lifetime would be gone within a few hours as the fire department worked to contain the fire. All was ultimately destroyed.

While I hope you never lose your home, I also hope you will strongly take the following advice to protect your largest monetary investment.

- Seriously, listen to your animals.
- Never leave a cordless tool battery charger unattended. Most modern cordless tools will charge in less than an hour. As soon as the battery is fully charged, remove it from the charger to avoid a disaster like we had.
- Examine your insurance coverage and review the current cost to rebuild your home. A good resource to find the original builder is Growth Manage, or the Leon County Property Appraiser's website that lists all permit activity. Over the years, former clients have requested an updated cost to rebuild their homes to the current mandatory building code in order that they may maintain proper coverage of their home. This is usually a free service with custom homebuilders who already

have all of the specifications and plans at their disposal for research of previously built homes. If the building company is no longer in business you should contact a qualified building contractor for a report stating the current cost to rebuild. While this service is not free it will be worth every dollar investing by having the correct coverage.

- Document your contents. Your insurance is split between the building (the box) and content (everything you have put inside the box). Your insurance company will request a list of all that was in the box if you have a loss in order to assign a value. I highly recommend spending some time taking pictures of the complete house and garage as well as any content in separate outbuildings. While taking pictures, open drawers and cabinets as well as closets. The more detail you can provide, the easier it will be to receive your due compensation. Start a detailed inventory list that can be substantiated by your pictures.
- Store your pictures and important documents to the cloud or a safe deposit box. I would not trust a fire proof safe.
- Review your policy for contents that may be "under insured" in case of loss. For example you may need to insure items like jewelry or collectibles separately to cover their replacement, if the policy limits are too low.
- Have valuable items such as jewelry, antiques, guns, etc. appraised.
- If you have a home based business back up your files often. There are many cloud base storage options available and if you only back up once a month using a thumb drive mail it to your CPA.
- Of course you should contact your insurance agent for further information concerning specific questions and coverage. In Florida, fire is not our main concern as we have hurricanes that can also totally destroy a home.

To all in the community that have reached out to my family through this difficult time, I want to say we appreciate each and every act of kindness along with all the encouragement we have received. We may have lost our home, but what we have seen is our true wealth we have in Tallahassee by your expressions of love, and willingness to extend a hand.


**Hazardous Waste:



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

**Things you can do:**

- Do you see a bucket, pail, pitcher, vase, tray, water drum, or unused flower pot that doesn't yet have a hole drilled into it (you know the one!)? Flip that thing!
- Is there an old tire or paint can? Discard it!
- Do you have a tree swing or boat cover collecting water in spots? Shake it up and get all that water out of there!
- Pond? Stock it with with mosquito fish, or anything else that will get that water moving.
- Lucky enough to have a swimming pool or spa? Chlorinate and filter those bad boys!
- Bird bath? Use a mosquito dunk! (They last about a month and are not dangerous to birds, frogs, squirrels, pets, or any other animal that might like a bath or a drink.)
- Roof Gutters? Clean them once a year!

Basically, wherever there is standing water for about a week, there is a possibility mosquitos are breeding.

Let's get out there and dump some things, shake some things, and flip some things! We have a beautiful neighborhood! Let's not let those blood suckers spoil it.

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# Who Does What for Our Lakes in Our Community?

## HOW YOU CAN HELP OUR LAKES!

Have you ever wondered who keeps an eye on the lakes in our community? Perhaps you may wonder why it is actually necessary to assess the overall quality of these waterbodies in the first place. Let's take a look to see with whom these responsibilities lay.

Close to home, the Killlearn Home Association (KHA) monitors the general health of the community lakes on a routine basis and is able to report concerns to local and State authorities. The KHA collects routine nutrient and water level data that provides consistent information on lake health through the year. The KHA is the community representative and advocate when it comes to reporting concerns and negotiating with local and State representatives to provide improved stormwater management and improved infrastructure for the community. It is also the KHA that searches for revenue to improve the health of these water bodies.

The City and County both have programs in place to monitor the health of the lakes within Leon County. You can visit the City's and Leon County web sites to learn more about the Leon County's Water Resources Program. It may surprise you to learn that the County has been collecting data on selected lakes since 1991.

### Why is it important to routinely monitor our lakes?

Monitoring our lakes allows for us to assess the long term health of the lakes. It allows us to identify trends and alerts the community to potential problems with the lake water quality. Routine monitoring also allow

for assessment of management programs to determine the benefit or harm of those program.

There are also specific programs in place to monitor the fish of our lakes. The State of Florida, through the Department of Health, Department of Environmental Protection, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (also known as FWC) and Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, jointly determine the levels of environmental chemicals present in fish living in Florida water bodies. Fish advisories are routinely updated to inform consumers of how much fish can be safely consumed, species of concern and even locations of concern. To see the report online, search for 2016 Florida Fish Advisories.

You do not need to be a lake-front property owner to make important observations for our lakes in the neighborhood. Do you come to the parks on the lakes to enjoy the scenery or wildlife? Do your part by making your own observations when walking or driving by the neighborhood lakes and then, if you have any observations or concerns, report them to the KHA. Be alert to changes in both the quantity and quality of the lake. If you notice issues of concern, be certain to report this to the KHA so they can contact the appropriate agency. Yes, you have a voice! Your observations are important!

The lakes in the Killlearn neighborhood are very special and they need you. These bodies of water are not stormwater ponds; they are **waters of the State of Florida**, unique sinkhole lakes which are an important hydrogeological feature to the environment of Florida. The Killlearn lakes are connected to our aquifer that we get our drinking water from, so any pollutants that enter the lake have the potential to directly enter into the deeper aquifer and then directly impact the water that we all drink in the Tallahassee and Leon area.

Be a good neighbor and help keep an eye on one of our most valued resources - *OUR* Lakes.

## Bacterial Algal Blooms in lakes Killarney and Kanturk

The recent high levels of water flowing into our lakes has caused an algal bloom resulting from extremely rapid growth of algae in a confined area (small lake). It looks like scum, pea soup, and/or like blue-green paint that has been stirred into the water. Most blooms are harmless, but our lakes currently have a high level of bacterial algae that should be avoided.

For the next few weeks, until the algae dissipates, you, your pets, and your guests should avoid contact with our lakes water in areas where the algae is visible.

**No swimming, fishing, or drinking the water  
If in doubt, stay out!**

# In the Tallahassee Garden



Typically May is one of our driest months, and brings summer heat, causing stress to plants. Most growing things need about an inch of water every week in order to thrive. If rainfall doesn't give that amount, irrigation is needed. Adding a half inch of water weekly will be enough for most plants, until the rains return to give a good soaking. Plants you set out this spring will require more frequent watering. If watering container plants by hand, water all pots twice, as the first application prepares the soil to accept the water applied the second time around.

**Lawns:** Water lawns only when grass blades turn a bluish-gray color and fold in half. Water in the early morning, and place several rain gauges throughout the sprinkler pattern to see when you've applied an average of one-half inch of water throughout the zone. This is a good time to plant plugs to fill in bare spots. Water frequently to get roots established.

**Flowering Trees and Shrubs:** Azalea pruning must be completed before early July, as later pruning would cut off next year's flowers! Prune with hand pruners, rather than hedge shears – this will retain a natural plant shape. Heavy pruning after mid-summer may also diminish camellia blooms the following spring. Gardenias may be pruned after blooming, and if the leaves are covered with black sooty mold, spray with either horticultural soap, or with an ultra-refined horticultural oil (not dormant oils, which can cause damage in hot weather). Some roses need regular sprays to control black spot and mildew. However, many old heirloom types and other landscape types such as 'Knockout' only need spraying if problems appear. Planting trees and shrubs now would require daily watering. You may want to wait until fall or winter when heat stress will be lower.

**Annuals and Perennials:** Many heat-loving flowers can be planted now, including zinnias, marigolds, vincas, annual or perennial salvias, red powder-puff (*Calliandra*), mandevilla, allamanda, and many others. Much of the fun of growing flowers is searching out unusual ones that you haven't tried before. Annuals need to be fertilized monthly, and need to be dead-headed to encourage blooming.

**Bulbs:** Now that the soil is well warmed, many summer bulbs can be planted, including daylilies,

caladium, crinum, gladiolus, iris, society garlic, and red-hot poker. Most bulb flowers appreciate a light fertilization as buds appear. Overcrowded bulbs don't bloom well; divide and transplant or share extras. Likewise, bulbs in too much shade don't bloom well.

**Fruits:** Blueberries, figs and grapes should be watered deeply as fruit is forming, and well mulched to retain soil moisture and retard weeds. Citrus trees need well drained soil, and mulch is not recommended right against the trunk, but may be applied a foot away. Fertilize citrus this month.

**Vegetables and Herbs:** Watch for tomato horn worms, and pick off as seen. Uneven soil moisture may cause tomatoes to crack or split, or develop blossom end rot. If squash plants start to wilt, look at stems for squash vine borers and cut out the borer, or prune off affected parts. Now is the time to plant southern peas, pole beans, eggplant, okra, butterbeans, sweet potatoes, melons, peanuts, acorn squash, pumpkins, and other heat-loving veggies and herbs (basil, oregano, sage, dill, Mexican tarragon and other heat loving herbs).
